Native

a person born in a specified place or associated with a place by birth, whether subsequently resident there or not



Immigration/immigrant

The action of coming to live permanently in another country

a person who comes to live permanently in a foreign country

Migration/migrant

Refers to the movement of people from one place to another, often to find work or better living conditions.

A person who moves from one place to another for work or better living conditions



"Great Migration" of African Americans from South to North

Westward **Expansion** Westward expansion, the **19th-century** movement of settlers into the American West, began with the Louisiana Purchase and was fueled by the Gold **Rush, the Oregon** Trail and a belief in "manifest destiny."

the 19th-century doctrine or belief that the expansion of the US throughout the American continents was both justified and inevitable







Growth of the United States 1783-1853




Push-Pull Factors

Factors that "push" people away from an area or "pull" people to an area to explain why people migrate.

The Homestead Act offered Western settlers free land which "pulled" many to the West.

Low-paying jobs in the East was a "push" factor.
